
After a long search, Starry finally met his elder brothers and sisters near a shipwreck, their new home in the marine sanctuary.








Swimming against the river flow was very difficult. They needed to use all their energy to overcome the strong current.






The parents started to train the little sturgeons about what to do and how to behave in the river: what to eat, how to swim safely, and how to hide to avoid dangers.
